California's 30x30 Initiative: Lis Olearts Sierra Nevada Alliance- presentation linked here

- 30x30 Sierra Nevada Regional Group: a group of over 80 organizations in the Sierra Nevada focused on California's 30x30 Initiative with active regional groups throughout the state and statewide working groups and committees
  - Regional groups meet monthly to share relevant info, grant opportunities
  - Working on Sierra Nevada 30x30 project list, working with Sierra Business Council, coordinating with state and regional efforts
  - o The goal is to leverage this opportunity to advance conservation projects in Sierra Nevada
- The 30x30 Initiatives is focused on conserving 30% of lands within state by 2030
  - US has committed to 30x30 goal as well, other countries have also

#### • CA 30x30 Initiative Timeline

- O Governor Newsome signed "Nature Based Solutions Executive Order" in October 2020
- o 2021 President Biden signed 30x30 Executive Order
- May 2021: America the Beautiful Report published, which outlined how to meet 30x30 goals
- April 2022: President Biden allocated \$1 billion for America the Beautiful projects
- o May 2022: CA Natural Resources Agency released Pathways to 30x30 Strategy Document
- August 2022: FY 22/23 California budget outlined over \$1.6 billion for 30x30 projects
- o Sept 2022- Bill AB2278- AB 2278 California Assembly (20212022) Open States
  - requires annual reporting on CA's progress to 30x30- helps solidify 30x30 as a reality, ensures that 30x30 persists despite administration change
- California Executive Order N-82-20: elevated role of natural and working lands in building climate resilience; advanced biodiversity conservation as administrative priority,
  - Natural and Working Lands Climate Smart Strategy: <u>Governor Newsom Joins</u>
    <u>Groundbreaking for World's Largest Wildlife Crossing as State Launches Nature-Based</u>
    <u>Strategies to Fight Climate Change and Protect Biodiversity | California Governor</u>
- Pathways to 30x30 document: intended to accelerate regionally led conservation/regional plans, enhance conservation of existing public lands, execute strategic land acquisitions, expand and accelerate restoration (a big goal) and long-term stewardship
- CA 30x30 Goals: focusing on quality and consistence of newly conserved areas, with focuses on biodiversity, access, climate change
  - o CA 30x30 Commitments: Tribal partnership, equity, and economy
- CalNature tool: <u>www.californianature.ca.gov-</u> many aspects to this tool, focus on biodiversity and climate resilience

#### Nature-Based Solutions Budget Summary for FY 22-23:

- \$1.53 billion to efforts on land acquisition and habitat restoration; \$118 million to efforts focused on wildlife corridors; \$70 million for tribal nature-based solutions; \$661 million for Climate Smart Land
- California Natural Resources Agency: Sierra Nevada Regional Group been reaching out to different funding agencies to find out how to allocate this budget
- CRNA does not want to create new funding mechanisms; they want to allocate budget to existing funding mechanisms - \$372 million available for projects in Sierra Nevada region
- Wildlife Conservation Board is actively looking for projects- they have \$1 billion available for projects. They have a single continuous grant application process, where applicants can consult with staff at any time, and applications don't need to determine which WCB Program their projects fit best
- Supporting Agencies CRNA having 30x30 Expo with all funding agencies on Nov. 10 at 10:30am for funding agents will talk about their programs

- CDFW- supporting 30x30 through fish and wildlife management, watershed restoration planning and protection, and land acquisition- multiple bond and grant programs, regional offices
- DOC also has grant program and will be supporting 30x30- \$14 million for planning and capacity for climate smart lands to support non-profits, communities on the ground for capacity building
- o SNC- \$26 million for projects, including new Landscape Grant Pilot Program
- o Department of Water Resources, Cal FIRE have funding as well

### LandTendr: Joe Flannery, Vibrant Planet- presentation linked here

- LandTendr: Cloud-Based Planning and Monitoring Tool, built for collaboratives, organizations, agencies
  - Intended to help people work together rather than be siloed this tool is meant to be democratized
  - Increasing capacity: breaking down vertical silos to increase pace and scale of restoration
- The NYFP is an example of creating an open system, an open methodology, developing and creating tools and systems for large-scale planning. **How did NYFP make things happen?** 
  - First- Partnership decided that pace and scale of analyzing landscape scale disturbances needs a more robust package, including more remotely sensed data, lidar, etc.
  - Then, came up with system for how to evaluate true values of a variety of assets by creating SARAs, Strategic Areas, Resources, and Assets, using a socioecological framework to evaluate landscape features that have societal values.
  - Then came up with standardized metric for where to treat on a landscape called an RROI, a Restorative Return on Investment, to estimate treatment locations so they can figure out how to view and prioritize landscape
  - Created system so they can determine at scale how to use this RROI metric

### • How is all of this encapsulated in this software program?

- How can we emulate this methodology and the systems developed? NYFP has raised over \$50 million for this watershed
- LandTendr operationalizes all of these methodologies and systems and allows others to duplicate it elsewhere
- LandTendr is a decision support system- based on science that empowers decisionmakers to make their own decisions. Other support tools have some decisions already made- this tool allows groups to determine their own priorities on the landscape
- System allows users to compete landscape-level analysis and project prioritizations using data and models, a landscape system to address landscape disturbances

#### • General Process for Using LandTendr

- Can outline Planning Area within Stewardship Atlas
- Data layers involving disturbance hazard layers, fire and drought hazards, can be added
- SARAs- Strategic Areas, Resources, and Assets transportation, utilities, safety zones, recreation facilities, animal species and communities, plants, etc. can be selected
- Can select which potential management/treatment types for landscapes- allows you to start to measure avoided loss based on things like operability, land ownership, etc. used to measure reduction in risk

- Can draw planning area anywhere in Stewardship Atlas, or can upload shapefile i.e.
  Nevada County, then set your priorities, then weight your objectives (assets, safety, recreation, biodiversity, etc
- Set your constraints: cost to treat, project size, budget per project, number of projects
- This will pop out your priority projects across the landscape- based on amount of risk reduction, with details per project
  - Can then look at comparisons of projects once they are outlined and prioritizedcan look at how objectives, assets, safety, recreation, biodiversity, carbon, water benefits, etc.
  - Can look at objective effects over time for different objectives
